"LOVE"

"7 Beloved, let us love one another: for love is of God; and every one that loveth is begotten of God, and knoweth God," I Jno. 4:7. In this passage we have the thought of "loving one another," and it is stated that "love is of God." From this we would conclude that "God is love," and all love springs from God – the source of "love" is God. There is no force manifest on the face of the earth, from whence comes love; but from God. In Rom. 1, there is a long list of characteristics designated and not in one of them can one find the aspect of "love." Love is from God and not from the pagan gods of this world.

We read of **light** being from God, I Tim. 6:15, "Lord of lights." Every "spiritual blessing," is from God, Eph. 1:3. In James we read of **good things** coming from God: "17 Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom can be no variation, neither shadow that is cast by turning," Jas. 1:17. Then, one can read of the "I AM's" and God is the source of all of the "I AM's." All, that is good and profitable for man, has come from God.

I read in Vine's this statement about love, "Love can be known from the actions it promotes." Found under the heading of "love," Vol. III, P. 21. This is stating that "love" expresses itself when there is action toward someone else. Through the years I have come to express it this way: "Love manifest itself in a person acting in a beneficial way toward others."

This action can be **toward God**, "37..... Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul and all thy mind," Matt. 22:37; "23 If a man love me, he will keep my word," Jno. 14:23. This action can be **toward your neighbor**, "39 And a second like unto it is this, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself," Matt. 22:39. This action can be **toward thy wife**, "25 Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ loved the church, and gave himself for it," Eph. 5:25. This action can be **toward thy husband**, "4 that they may train the young women to love their husbands," Tit. 2:4, etc. It is important to establish the fact of love being that which acts toward others.

The **greatest of all** is the example of God loving us, "16 For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life," Jno. 3:16. When he manifest his love toward us, it is easy to see that **God acted in a beneficial way toward us!** We need to remember the words of John, "19 We love because he first loved us," I Jno. 4:19.

A good example of what it would be like to **not have love**, would be the man who had a bountiful crop and was perplexed as to what to do: "16 And he spake a parable unto them, saying, The ground of a certain rich man brought forth plentifully: 17 and he reasoned within himself, saying, What shall I do, because I have not where to bestow my fruits? 18 And he said, This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my grain and my goods. 19 And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, be merry. 20 But God said unto him, Thou foolish one, this night is thy soul required of thee; and the things which thou hast prepared, whose shall they be? 21 So is he that layeth up treasure for himself and is not rich toward God," Lk. 12:16-21. This same lesson is taught in Matt. 19:16-22. Consider the conclusion of the lesson in Matt. 19:22, "22 But when the young man heard the saying, he went away sorrowful; for he was one that had great possessions!" This man loved his possessions so much he could not manifest love toward God and others – act in a beneficial manner toward others.

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
