## "TIME"

Often, I am told, "Time just passes so fast!" Every time I hear this statement I am reminded of something told me a long time ago: "There are sixty seconds in a minute, sixty minutes in an hour, twenty four hours in a day, three-hundred-sixty five days in a year, ten years makes a decade, etc....." Time still moves the same: neither faster nor slower, **it is the same**. I will take time to do what I desire to do.

I thought, at that time, he was expressing an impossibility. Please tell me how a person can retire from living the Christian life? As long as we have breath, life, and ability, we must continue to preach the gospel of Christ that others may hear and be saved, Rom. 10:17.

"15 Look therefore carefully how ye walk not as unwise, but as wise; 16 redeeming the time because the days are evil," Eph. 5:15-16. It is not like a cell phone in which you acquire minutes to be used later – one cannot do this with the time of life. I must take advantage of time.
